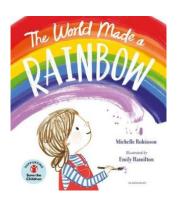

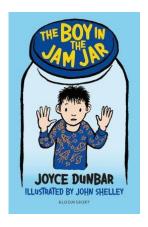

Years 5 and 6 Recommendation

Turtle Boy (M. Evan Wolkenstein)

12-year-old Will likes two things: turtles and the local nature reserve. Everything else is a nightmare because Will has a facial difference that has earned him an unfortunate nickname. But when Will's Bar Mitzvah community service project introduces him to RJ, a boy who is confined to a hospital room, Will discovers they both have strength to lend the other and that life is too short to live in a shell. A book filled with empathy, humour and knowledge about turtles!

EYFS Recommendation

The World Made a Rainbow(Michelle Robinson)

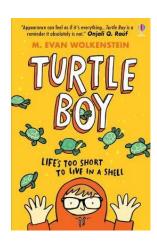

Years 3 and 4 Recommendation

The Boy in the Jam Jar (Joyce Dunbar)

Dylan can't hear as well as he used to be able to and he doesn't want to be different from his friends. As his hearing gets worse, he becomes more and more isolated from his friends. Luckily his dog, Pluto, is there to keep him down to Earth... This heart-warming story is perfect for developing readers and highlighting hidden struggles.

The House with Chicken Legs (Sophie Anderson) – 9+

Marinka dreams of a normal life, where her house stays somewhere long enough for her to make friends. But her house has chicken legs and moves on without warning. The only people Marinka meets are dead; they disappear when her grandmother, Baba Yaga, guides them through The Gate. Marinka wants to change her destiny, but her house has other ideas...

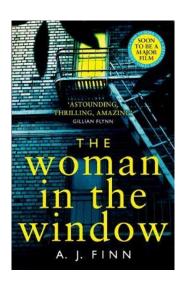

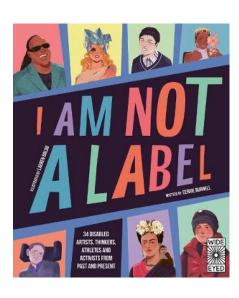
Children's & Adult's Non-Fiction

I Am Not a Label (Cerrie Burnell)

Consisting of 34 double-page spreads, one for each role model, and two special sections on mental health and 'invisible disabilities', Cerrie Burnell has put together a fascinating collection of inspiring stories. Meet a range of artists, thinkers, athletes and activists with disabilities, from past and present. From Frida Kahlo to Stephen Hawking, find out how these iconic figures have overcome obstacles, owned their differences and paved the way for others by making their bodies and minds work for them.

An empowering read for children and adults alike that will challenge your preconceptions of disability and mental health.





Adult's Fiction

The Woman in the Window (A.J.Finn)

Anna Jones, a chronic agoraphobic, hasn't left her home in ten months. Her husband has left her, taking their daughter with him, so she spends her days binge-watching black and white films and roaming around her house like a ghost. Anna's one constant lifeline to the real world is her window, where she spends hours watching her neighbours. Until one evening when a scream rips across the silence and Anna witnesses something no one was supposed to see. Now she must do everything she can to uncover the truth but will anyone believer her? And can she trust herself?

A brilliantly gripping read full of twists and turns that keep you guessing at every page. Read it before the film is released later this year.

Developing Inference through Reading

Inference is a particularly tricky skill that children tend to struggle with as it requires a wide range of knowledge and life skills. Inference is 'reading between the lines' to unpick information that has not been explicitly shared. Children are taught to do this in their own writing through 'show not tell' so this may be a good way of explaining inference to them.

Questions for inference may include:

- How does the character feel? How do you know?
- What was ... thinking when...?
- Who is telling the story?
- Find and copy a group of words which show that...

These questions usually focus on the character's body language e.g. hunched shoulders to indicate sadness or shyness; looking away to indicate lying. Why not play emotion charades with your child to develop their understanding of body language and things they can infer from this.

Widening Genres and Text Types

Research shows that children who say they don't like reading don't understand the wide variety of text types that are available.

You should utilise all reading resources to find what your child enjoys and allow them to be challenged by reading a variety of genres and contexts which will lead to a wider array of vocabulary. Texts such as:

- recipe books
- comics/ graphic novels
- newspapers/ magazines
- online blogs

are great ways of encouraging reading. I subscribe to The Week Junior (https://theweekjunior.co.uk) for my class and they love it, despite how challenging some of the vocabulary is!
